The GALESS TiltShift Challenge (GTC) addresses an effort to contribute to awareness about complex questions in different research-domains. In 2025, the research domain is connected to "Empty Pocket". The GTC "Empty Pocket" is looking for sustainable and responsible answers from our young generation coming in from each part of the world in this particular domain. The TiltShift Challenge Empty Pocket consists of 2 conference editions in 2025 with locations in Vienna-Austria and Singapore.

The TiltShift Challenge includes a standard period for research efforts and the production of a final report followed up by physical presentations. The conference held in Singapore will start on June 30, 2025 and end on July 03, 2025. The research activities are meant to be set in a school environment, in a school team of 3-4 students and a guiding teacher. Reference contacts from your school, local community, and region may have served as "living libraries" to support the research report as indicated in Information Pack 1 / 2.

Research Thesis Description

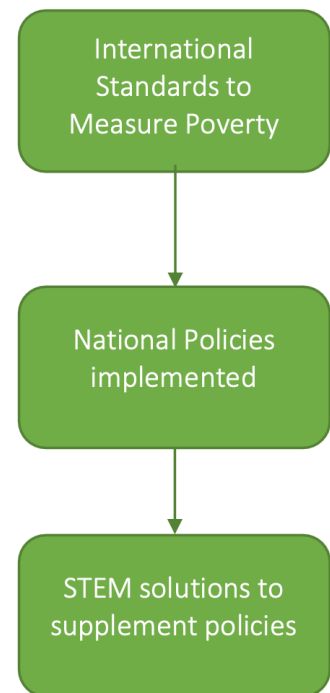
Do ensure that your project deliverables (report, poster and presentation) addresses the research thesis guiding questions below.

Question 1: Investigate your country's poverty status.

- a) How does your country fare in the Multidimensional Poverty Index (MPI) developed by the Oxford Poverty & Human Development Initiative (OPHI)?
- b) Examine the challenges faced by vulnerable groups in your country. How does your country fare in terms of degrees of social exclusion of the vulnerable population?

Question 2: Discussing measures taken to eradicate poverty.

- a) Discuss and evaluate three policies your country has implemented to alleviate poverty, focusing on either capability enhancement or social exclusion reduction.
- b) Propose a new or improve on an existing STEM solution that can be adopted to reduce poverty. Describe the scientific and technological concepts utilised and design a prototype to illustrate the proposed solution.

Your research report will be published on the GALESS website one week before the conference and will be published in the GALESS Challenge book Empty Pocket end of 2025. The reports will be read by the local jury-team-panel as well as by a representative of the GALESS Jury Board.

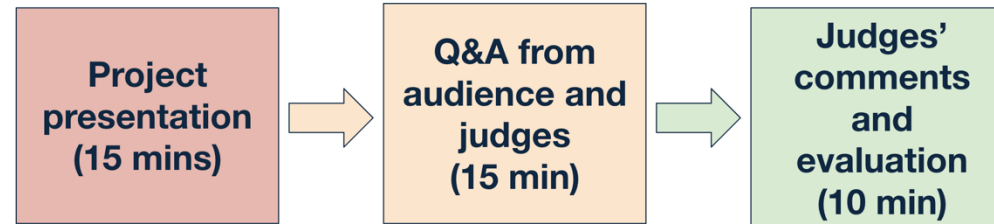

Advice for travelling to and in Singapore:

1. Prepare required documents

- Valid passport (with at least 6 months validity)
- Visa (if applicable) — check if your nationality requires a visa for Singapore
- Comprehensive travel insurance covering medical emergencies

2. Weather & clothing

- Singapore is hot and humid (25–32 °C) year-round. Do remember to pack your sunscreen and mosquito repellent (if needed!).
- Other than your formal school attire, you can bring light, breathable clothing when you travel around Singapore during your free time. Do also remember to pack a pair of covered shoes for the learning journey on Day 3.
- Do also pack an umbrella or rain jacket as we tend to have frequent short rain showers.

3. Currency & payments

- Currency: Singapore Dollar (SGD)
- Cash is useful for hawker centres and small shops, but most places accept credit/debit cards. There is also easy access to ATMs and money changers.

4. Health & safety

- Tap water is safe to drink.
- Singapore is very clean and safe, but do still practice basic precautions (watch your belongings in crowded areas!). Low crime \neq no crime.
- No eating or drinking in MRT trains/buses (fines apply).
- Please take note of the following emergency hotlines:
 - Police (non-medical emergencies): 999
 - Ambulance & Fire Brigade (medical or fire emergencies): 995
 - General Emergency Ambulance (private services): 1777 (for non-life-threatening cases)
- There are strict laws on drugs, vandalism, littering, jaywalking and restrictions on smoking in public places in Singapore.

5. Transport

- Public transport in Singapore is efficient, safe, and affordable, including options like the MRT and buses. You can purchase an EZ-Link card to conveniently pay for your rides at MRT stations or convenience stores.
- Walking is common in city areas, do prepare a pair of comfortable walking shoes for Day 2 and 3.

6. Time zones and electrical connectivity

- Singapore's standard time runs on UTC +8 hours.
- Electricity in Singapore runs on 230 V, 50 Hz, Plug type: Type G (3 rectangular prongs in a triangular pattern).
- Do remember to bring a Type G travel adapter if needed and also a voltage convertor if your devices are rated for 110 V. Most modern devices (laptops, phone chargers) are dual-voltage.
